Our solo players were Jack Convery and Gary Neuman, Hall of Famer Charlie Tagawa and Classical Banjoist Tim Weed. The event featured the East Bay Banjo Club, Peninsula Banjo Band, Sacramento Banjo Band, San Francisco Banjo Band, and the Original Red Garter Band. During the interludes, we were entertained by the Smalltimers, a five piece band, playing their favorite Ragtime arrangements. They were a big hit.

Rene Karnes, Banjo Hall of Fame inductee and luthier, performed her magic by repairing banjos, selling parts and giving sound advise on the care and maintenance of banjos.

In the vendors area, banjo design jewelries were available as well as old time sheet music. There were also some beautiful banjos for sale.

Travels With Garry Kerr – The Great Lakes International Banjo (GLIB) Convention.

GLIB is a three day event put on by a coalition of five banjo clubs in the Detroit area. This year the weather in Dearborn was uncharacteristically warm, a pleasant change from the usual cold. I arrived at the Doubletree Hotel late Thursday afternoon and as usual could barely hear the check-in clerk due to the loud jam going on in the lobby/atrium. The next day the two vendor rooms opened, and there were workshops, off-site playouts, and the evening show. Saturday schedule was similar with an added afternoon matinee. All 3 shows were packed. Like most banjo conventions the shows take place in the hotel ballroom, like Peninsula only larger. Since two shows occur in the evenings, lighting and sound are professional quality. Both evening shows ran past midnight, which kind of put the kibosh on the post show jams this year, in fact I don't know if the Sat. night jam ever really got started. Post show jams are by far the largest, typically begin about 11:30 pm and continue through the wee hours. In years past I have given up at 2:00 am leaving 60 – 70 players banging away. Eastern banjoists take their hobbies seriously! The range of talent on the stage runs from mediocre to exciting and the shows always have some top shelf talent who perform and present workshops for free. There are always a few West coasters at the show, this year including a small consist of the Wineland BB. Eastern banjo shows typically take place on Friday and Saturday, leaving Sunday for travel. Unfortunately this was the twentieth and final GLIB. The show committee has grown weary and has not been able to attract sufficient new blood. The final note is a sad one, a popular banjoist in Mike Kuehn's band complained of chest pain as he exited the stage, moments later he collapsed and died backstage. A comment was heard that he died doing what he loved, playing banjo. He was 59.

Summer Jazz Banjo Festival, June 14**Reported By: Bill Sullivan****The consensus is in...it was a hit!**

The First Annual Summer Jazz Banjo Festival at Saint Mary's College on June 14, 2009 (Flag Day no less!) was a sell out. The audience was enthusiastic; singing, clapping and tapping their feet to the amazing music that filled the air. After months of planning and preparation (we began this journey in October 2008), we did it!

The show of shows featured 2 stages , BBQ, and plenty of toe tapping fun for all. The second stage in Claey's Lounge, was an intimate setting for the headliners "second" sets, and also served as the children's workshop location. The kids took part in the grand finale playing the gutbuckets they had built earlier, along with kazoos and penny whistles.

The show on the main stage opened with the Sacramento Banjo Band who played their hearts out, and included a wandering clarinet player. Not to be outdone, Banjo Hall-of- Famer Harry Higgins and the Red Garter Band- a true original, and special treat for many, followed and thrilled us with their banjo, tuba and trombone playing, so much so that folks began dancing in front of the stage. We were then charmed by the newly formed, and fabulous, Wineland Banjo Band with members from throughout Northern California. The interludes between sets offer a special treat for all was the "Smalltimers" a ragtime quintet. They were a unanimous hit with all.

Next up, Jack Convery & Friends. The highlight of their set was twelve-year-old soloist Natalie Taut, who had the poise of one twice her age. She sang many standards but her version of the Beatles "Honey Pie" stole the show. The San Francisco Banjo Band followed with an enthusiastic set that has us all on our feet. The four-string banjo never sounded better. Having not played out in many years they were keenly watch by all the banjo players in attendance. We look forward to their playing in next years festival. Banjo Hall-of-Famer Charlie Tagawa & Friends were up next, their music was so amazing that if you closed your eyes you'd swear he was playing anything but a Banjo! The Peninsula Banjo Band followed, lead by Charlie Tagawa. They delivered a lively and fun filled set.

Headliner Tim Weed, a five-string banjo player-beyond the constraint of traditional bluegrass held the hall spellbound with his extraordinary style and heart felt emotion. You guessed it, the home team; The East Bay Banjo Club, brought the show home and really delivered the goods. We had the crowd all singing along to the songs of our youth-and we looked pretty snazzy, gold vests and tiny American flags waving from our banjos. We brought the house to their feet when our special guest, nine-year-old Natalia Cortez, sang Take Me Out To The Ballgame dressed appropriately in her baseball uniform. The big finish, with all banjo players in the house playing, was a sweet and moving rendition of the "Bells Of Saint Mary's". A fitting way to say thank you to our festival home.
