MEMBER SPOTLIGHT

What is a Banjo Base?

Guy Black of the East Bay Banjo Club, Contra Costa Co., Calif. long dreamed of making a cigar box guitar that would really work. When he was a little guy, On Sunday afternoons, family and friends would gather on his Grandfather's front porch and play music, sing and drink ice tea. His uncle helped him build a guitar out of a cigar box and copper wire. Small nails were just right for wrapping the strings around. It made noise so Guy joined in the fun. That was all forgotten until he saw The Ashbury.

When Guy was in the 5th grade the Glen Miller Band played at his school, He took up trumpet the next day and played brass all through school, including

the bass Tuba the last three years of school. Guy played the Gut bucket at Shakey's and many other places in the area.

Over the years, Guy played several types of Bass fiddles both electric and acoustic, He even put together an old flat back German bass that he got in a basket; it was a good sounding Bass.

He was happy to find the East Bay Banjo Band and have a place to play. He saw his first Ashbury bass at the Banjo Rama in Carmichael 3 or 4 years ago and couldn't wait to get one.

He bought an Ashbury from Brock at Large Sound and enough spare parts to build 2 more. That 's when the cigar box popped back. But instead of a guitar He would build a bass.

Since He plays in a banjo band, why not a Banjo Bass. Thanks to his Middle School woodworking classes, he learned that he could build or fix most anything he began.

The ideas started coming that he could build a bass out of old banjo parts.

Four banjos went into the finished product. Guy built the neck and headstock, Brock and Kelly from Large Sound supplied parts from the Ashbury, now made by Fender

He got together enough parts to begin, some parts were built and some were purchased. The biggest help came from EBBC members; Garry Kerr gave Him a box of old banjos & parts. Bill Cooper gave him an old banjo that wasn't playable. But just what he needed. The final touch was a piece of walnut burl his

> neighbor gave him for the head. Guy sawed it up in to strips a

bout 1/3 of inch & glued it on the headstock, sanded & polished..

The Banjo part is just a façade; the guts are built of solid maple, routed out where needed. The stiffness of the solid maple gives better sound than a softer wood. He said, "It was a chore making the offset

neck secure enough to let the banjo head come down over it". It would be possible to pull the banjo parts off and still play, but it wouldn't look as pretty!!

A wireless transmitter was added, making it possible to walk around playing without being tied down with a cable. It fit in the resonator nicely. He plans more whistles & bells. A Work- in- progress. He's also thinking about a cigar box. Who knows?

A Banjo Under the Bed?

The banjo may well be the most misunderstood and underrated musical instrument in existence today.

The ancestor of the banjo probably originated in Arabia a thousand years ago. The instrument, called the Rebec, consisted of a hollowed-out gourd, animal skin stretched over an opening cut in the gourd, and a neck supporting three gut strings. The Rebec found its way to West Africa, and was brought to the American Colonies. When the popularity of the "Banjar" was noted by Thomas Jefferson, in Virginia, the instrument had acquired a fourth string and by the mid- and late-nineteenth century the fifth string was added.

With the advent of jazz during the early years of the twentieth century the five-string banjo suffered a severe blow. The harmonic limitations imposed by the fifth string made it unsuitable for intricate chord progressions of jazz and it just wasn't loud enough to compete with the rest of the typical jazz combo.

As a result, the fifth string was eliminated, the neck shortened, the head enlarged, a resonator added, and heavier strings put on. The product of these modifications was called a "tenor", or "plectrum" banjo because it was strummed with a pick. Thus, the banjo be-

came a rhythm instrument, and spawned even further hybrids, such as "banjolins", smaller, eight-stringed mandolin-like instruments
