This month I'd like to share some playing techniques that I have learned over the years. I have observed that the easy part of playing an instrument is learning to play it. The more difficult part is playing it along with others, in order to create a harmonious and well blended sound.



In previous articles I have addressed basic musical information and now I would like to deal with playing techniques.

First, the tempo (rhythm): For a group, this is the most critical component. Someone must set the tempo either with a count or introduction. Once it has been set it must be followed by all that are playing in the group. All players not playing either harmony or melody should be playing rhythm. So now comes the question, "just who/what do I follow when playing rhythm?"

- Vocals If there is a vocalist, that is the person to follow and the vocalist should keep an even tempo all through the tune you have no choice and must follow the vocalist's tempo.
- Bass If no vocalist then the bass is the instrument to follow the bass must keep a steady and solid beat for everyone to follow and the vocalist(s) should be following the bass also.

Second, the harmony: Harmony is playing that supports and re-enforces the melody, but does not duplicate it. Harmony should not be the audible focus of the tune for the listeners; the melody should always be the focus. Harmony playing is acquired with practice and developing an ear for various chord and note patterns. Harmony can also be picked notes rather than chords, as long as it adds to the tune.

Third, the melody: The melody is the voice (lyrics) of the song, be it vocal or presented by an instrument. Rarely is it proper to have more than one melody player at a time. However, this can sound really nice if it is done by two different **Continued on page 2**

Instruments, as a pair or a voice and an instrument together harmonizing, much like two vocalists singing together.

Ironically, many soloists have a tendency to vary the tempo and over-play rhythm. The reason for this is that they have worked at developing methods to emphasize playing songs that sound wonderful when soloing but with a group or band it doesn't work real well. It's easy to do all sorts of things when one is playing alone, even add or omit notes and also vary the rhythm – anything goes playing solo – it adds character!

Funny thing - did you notice that I have have not used the word "Banjo". The concepts in this article apply to playing any instrument – banjos included.

Oh yes, what about that loudness thing? The order of dominance when playing in a group is that the melody (vocal and/ or lead player) should be the loudest "out in front" with all the others playing support.

My Cigar Box Ukuleles

I recently built two ukuleles out of cigar boxes. I made the neck of the first one out of a piece of birch wood and I shaped the wood so that the peg head was at 15 degrees to the fingerboard. I added a thin piece of trim and installed metal frets. I connected the neck to the cigar box, cut tone holes in the box, and added tuners. This ukulele has a nice sound to it.

I made a second ukulele out of a deeper cigar box. I put a piece of birch wood inside the box and attached it to the underside of the top of the box, parallel to the neck. I used another piece of the birch wood and added it to the top of the neck to make the 15 degree angle. I made the frets out of toothpicks and added a piece of trim. The tone holes are on the sides of the 'head' this time. This ukulele doesn't have as nice of a tone as the other, so further experimentation with fret material, tone hole size, depth of the box, etc. is required. The total cost of this ukulele was under \$20.
