The Great Lakes International Banjo Convention

Here I am in beautiful (?) Dearborn, an industrial suburb of Detroit.

This show is probably the biggest in the nation and is staged by a consortium of 5 banjo clubs. For the official 2 days of the show there are several workshops 2 vendor display rooms, three shows consisting of 35 acts, and of course nearly nonstop jamming around the clock. There were fewer players here from the West Coast than years past.

Friday:

This morning there were workshops but I elected to go with a group of about a dozen players to a play out downtown, outdoors and a bit chilly, but ok. The leader chose the songs wisely, taking into account players from all over the country, and things went surprisingly well.

Jam sessions here have a slightly different character than in the West. Tenor banjos are the majority and their players tend to lay back and let the plectrum minority who play more vigorously do the work. Whenever any West Coast players join in everything gets kicked up several notches. The evening show was pretty fair. Jack Convery was on last and was excellent, if a bit subdued. After the show a jam session continued to the wee hours. Saturday:

Jack opened the matinee with a much livelier performance than the night before, more like the Jack we know. Also on the bill was 13 year old Cody Clauson on the tenor banjo. His family makes their living doing a vaudeville type show, and their presentation is very theatrical and a bit corny. I guess it doesn't take much to entertain folks up there in Wisconsin. He has a lot of stage presence and plays very basic stuff. He has the fastest right hand I've ever seen, probably not unlike a legendary Scotsman we often hear about.

The evening show was standing room only and featured the best acts of the 3 shows. Al Allotta was probably the top soloist - a Peabody clone. The Clauson family was back and they kicked it up several notches. Cody is a very high energy entertainer and has the fastest right hand I've ever seen, but just up & down strokes. The all ladies pickup band had about 30 players and did some pretty ambitious stuff, That's Aplenty, etc. Again this year A country flavor band called Picks & Sticks, I feel outclassed all other entertainment. Big, big sound. The show ended about 11:45 and the last jam was in full swing by midnight. Probably 100+ jammers. I had to leave the jam early because my 06:30 wake-up call was rushing towards me. This was my fourth visit to this show and always enjoyable.
