In Memoriam - Yvonne "Mickie" McDonald

On January 5, 2014, longtime EBBC member Mickie McDonald passed away in her home. She played the banjo and sang with the EBBC for many, many years and rarely missed a playout. She didn't read music and taught herself to play the banjo by ear. She could sing in several languages and we occasionally heard her sing a beautiful version of "Silent Night" in German. Many people didn't know that she also played the piano. Sharing a love of music with her was magical - she was a master of harmony and it was my privilege to sing duets alongside her.

Irish? Oh, yes, she was Irish and loved it! She shared this love by singing Irish songs and wearing a lot of green, but she was color blind and had a hard time with different shades of colors. Mickie had many friends, yet she was also a very private person. I was pleased to drive her to practices and play outs for many years and during these trips we talked a lot and I learned a lot about her.

Mickie was a "military brat" who went to school in Japan and learned to speak Japanese. Later, she became a special education teacher and always talked fondly about her past students. We had a lot of fun sharing special education stories. Mickie could also read Braille and was fluent in American Sign Language. She continued her wonderful work with children by volunteering for CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates) for over 20 years. She really enjoyed being a special friend to those children that she was assigned to help. Her van was always full of stuffed animals, games, and just about anything that a child would like. She not only gave things to the children she served, she gave unconditional love to them. She also loved to bring special little gifts for the children that played with the EBBC. She really cared about people and their needs. One example is that the EBBC has a blind player and Mickie always gave him a stuffed something for his birthday instead of a card.

Mickie was the Hospitality Chair for the EBBC for several years. She picked out wonderful birthday, sympathy, and get well cards for all of us to sign for all of the EBBC members. What many didn't know is that Mickie was dyslexic! This made the Hospitality job a lot harder than we would have ever imagined... She was also an avid collector of old sheet music – she loved the covers and the original lyrics and would share the music with everyone who was interested.

Mickie was a member of MENSA and said that the members of MENSA were just the same as everyone else, but that they had different "punch lines" for their jokes! As intelligent as she was, she had an awful time mastering the computer and she never did figure out the printer. She often came over to my house to get computer help and we ended up with a lot of extra duet practice. Mickie was such an outstanding lady - I miss her calls and rides with me. I know that she is ever watchful over all of us that she shared her life with.

Introducing Songs

Okay, I confess that I'm writing this as notes for myself because the hardest part of playing music for me is introducing songs. So here we go......

Basic introduction purposes:

- Establishes the rhythm for the song.
- If possible or needed, includes a small bit of the song melody.
- Presents a clear downbeat note or chord run as a cue for the group to start playing.

Many introductions can consist of the last 8 bars of the song. However, care should be taken to make the introduction brief and not too lengthy. This method automatically eliminates a repetition of introduction styles. The most difficult introduction for a group is a simple count down. This type of introduction should be avoided unless the group is well "seasoned" from playing together frequently or has a familiar vocalist to start the song.

Introductions should also have enough volume so the audience and the group can clearly hear it. A major concern associated with playing a banjo is to not beat on it. Hard playing results in both a complete loss of tonal quality (not joking!) and also causes other banjo members to play harder, in order to be heard. This is not good because the music just becomes a lot of noise!

Generally, once the introduction is complete, the player should drop back to playing rhythm or harmony, if he/she is not designated as playing the lead. This is a basic method and one will develop an ear for this with the experience of playing with groups. There are no fixed rules and the variety of playing techniques by group members can add color to the sound as long as the rhythm is steady and strong.

One should keep in mind that the sound from a banjo is directed out from the front of the instrument and the player is above and behind it, so the banjo may not sound as loud to the player as it is to the listener located in the front. It's always a good habit to ask others around you how you sound to them – I always do and then I compensate accordingly. Sometimes the answer I get surprises me, so I know how important it is to ask the listeners how it sounds to them.

I hope this helps and now it's back to working on introductions...

All aboard for the Snow Train 2014! Several East Bay strummers boarded the train early on February 4th, bound for Reno, Nevada. The train made several stops along its journey from Oakland to Reno. Most passengers boarded in Martinez, but players also boarded in Emeryville and Sacramento, including Dick Martin, who rode a train from Oregon to Sacramento to join Jack Convery as a banjo "headliner."

The event took on an international flair this year with the addition of Mr. Fetze Pijlman from Hilversum, Holland. Mr. Piljman, who organizes the Holland Jazz Banjo Festival (www.jazzbanjo.nl) enjoyed playing traditional jazz on his tenor banjo while seeing the sights the High Sierra Mountains offer in the winter. There were some preliminary discussions about some American banjo players journeying to Holland to participate in the Holland Jazz Banjo Festival in the future. Jack was very excited about that possibility, which reminded us of our trip to the Czech Republic in 2005. Don't be surprised if some East Bay strummers are performing in Europe in 2015!

As is customary, we played many traditional jazz tunes while riding the train to Reno. Kit Nelson sang using the sound system provided by Jack, and many of those riding in the car sang along using song books provided by Jack. We were also accompanied by a keyboard player, who managed to set up his keyboard between the seats and allowed just enough room for people to pass by in the aisle. The conductor, trying to avoid being a killjoy, held back his admonishments and looked the other way during his strolls through the train car. We arrived on schedule in Reno. After checking into our rooms, we were on our own to eat, gamble, or see a show. Some people even jammed a little in their rooms!

The next day, everyone gathered in the Hobby Horse Room to practice some tunes that we were going to play that night in the Sapphire Lounge in Harrah's. During the practice session, every player was given the opportunity to select a song to be played on stage. It was a huge thrill to play with talented people outside the EBBC. Our appearance on the stage at the Sapphire Lounge was fun, even though a little cramped. The audience, comprised mostly of folks from our train car ride up to Reno, enthusiastically sang and danced to the music we created in the lounge. Frankly, the crowds in the casino were extremely sparse, so we could have easily attracted more people into the lounge, had business been better in Reno. While on stage, we were all informed that the train would arrive late the next morning. We were all advised to dial Amtrak directly to avoid missing its arrival. Some thought it was actually good news, since it meant we could sleep late the next day, and Harrah's was willing to extend us all a late checkout.

The next morning, Jack awoke each of us with a phone call that informed us of a bus that would leave in lieu of the 8:30 departure of the train. Apparently, the train was going to be close to five hours late due to a problem with a freight train blocking the tracks. Most people opted for the bus, which took us to Sacramento. From there, we were able to catch a train back to the Bay Area, stopping at all stops covered on the original trip to Reno. All is well that ends well! The train from Sacramento arrived back in the East Bay before our original train made it to Reno.


