Advice Offered For Playing Rhythm Banjo

There is a great difference between playing a guitar, as compared to playing a banjo. A guitar by nature does not deal well with hard playing and therefore it isn't played hard even by beginners. The banjo, on the other hand, is of a drum-style construction and many players, particularly newer plays, have a natural tendency to play the banjo too hard because it seems like the thing to do --- especially if one is playing along with other banjo players so they feel a need to be heard.

Unfortunately, playing hard on a banjo takes away from its already limited tonal

qualities. The more banjos you add to a group, the louder they are collectively and then it can turn into just a lot of noise. Banjos are by nature loud and it takes a little time to learn how to play it softly. My suggestion for beginners is to learn to play chords holding the pick loosely or use a soft pick. Either of these methods will help result in softer playing. It's much easier to start learning banjo-playing softly and then play harder when needed, than it is to learn playing hard first and then play softly when you need to.

When playing rhythm in a group, be aware of how loud you and the others are playing. If you can't hear the lead melody or the vocalist then the rhythm players are playing too loud. A guide for this is for the rhythm players to play as if a vocalist is singing each and every song. The melody of a tune must always dominate. Rhythm is the support foundation for the melody and should not overpower it.

Here are a few things to remember for rhythm banjo playing:

- Play in support of the group, not for yourself.
- Play every tune as if a vocalist is singing the melody.
- Keep in mind that the banjo is much louder to those in front of you than it is to you.
- If others are playing loud don't play loud also.
- If you can't hear the melody, the rhythm is too loud.

PBS Provides Early American Banjo History

The PBS American Roots Music web page offers this interesting look at the origins of the banjo in America.

"...as early as 1781 Thomas Jefferson, writing about slaves on his own plantation, said, 'the instrument proper to them is the Banjar, which they brought hither from Africa.' Many of these early banjars were made from gourds and played with a fretless neck. We have no idea how these sounded, but surviving illustrations suggest they used heavy strings and probably had a deep, mellow sound. By 1847 we have eyewitness accounts of the fiddle and banjo being played together in the South - the origin of the modern string band or bluegrass band."
