Midwest Banjo Camp Slated For June 6-9

Midwest Banjo Camp XV, an annual camp that offers the study of old-time and bluegrass banjo with some of the best banjo players around, is scheduled for June 6-9 at the Olivet College Campus in Olivet, Michigan. The town is about thirty minutes south of Lansing, the state capitol.

The list of instructors is like a "who's who" of world-class banjoists. Tenor banjo instructor will be the great Don Vappie, assisted by Keith Baumann. Old-time banjo instructors include Roy Andrade, Cathy Barton Para, Riley Baugus, Frank Evans, Adam Hurt, Joe Newberry, Ken Perlman, Lukas Pool, Stephen Wade and Dan Walsh. Bluegrass instructors include Tony Trischka, Gina Furtado, Danny Barnes, Janet Beazley, BB Bowness, Greg Cahill, Ryan Cavanaugh, Julie Elkins, Bill Evans and Alan Munde.

You can register for the full camp, which runs Thursday through Sunday, June 6-9, or the weekend-only option which is Friday through Sunday, June 7-9.

Students at the camp are free to take any class at any time. You can move freely between different styles of banjo and different experience levels. Students also can take classes in different instruments. Besides banjo, classes will be offered in bass, fiddle, guitar, mandolin, and jam skills.

Choosing A Pick For Beginning Banjo Players

This article is focused on the "flat pick" used by four-string banjoists, not the "finger picks" used by five-string banjo players.

Selecting a pick can be a daunting experience of trial and error. Picks come in a wide variety of materials, thicknesses and shapes. Over the years I have used a variety of picks and have settled on one style and firmness that works well for me.

Up into the early 1960's the pick of choice for professional banjo players was made of real tortoise shell. Besides being somewhat expensive they were subject to breakage and were discontinued when nylon and plastic became available. The newer robust nylon and teflon picks can last for years of playing. I bought a triangular teflon pick in the late 1960's and used it for 40 years. It was very slightly worn but it eventually became curved which made it difficult to tremolo (sweeping the pick continuously and smoothly up and down across all of the strings).

I then started the trial-and-error process of selecting a new pick. At first, I thought a stiff rigid pick would be best because that's what I had used before. However, I found the stiff picks were easy to strum up and down but not to tremolo with. I then tried a thin flexible pick and found it was easy to tremolo with but difficult to selectively pick notes with any volume.

My final choice was a medium pick that was good for both picking and tremolos. I could hold the pick loosely to play softly and hold it tighter to play louder, so the thickness is the key for me. Once you find the pick of your choice be sure to buy a few spares in case of loss. You should always have an extra pick handy somewhere on the instrument in case you drop the pick while playing.

The thickness of picks is measured in millimeters. I found the Dunlop Maxi-Grip 0.73mm pick best for me. These are inexpensive nylon picks that come in packs of twelve. These picks are available in other thicknesses as well. Picks are easy to drop, so some picks will have slight ridges, bumps or holes to help you hold on to them. The Dunlop Maxi-Grip picks have little bumps.

If you need to experiment in finding the right pick for you, buy various thicknesses to try. When you have determined which is best for you, buy a few better-quality picks of that thickness.
